Malnutrition shrinks young bodies. Trauma ages young minds. In some families, a six-year-old has become “the

## Freedom of speech v/s Responsible journalism

*Freedom of Speech v/s. Responsible Journalism*

Article 19(1)(a) of the Indian Constitution guarantees the Fundamental Right to "Freedom of Speech and Expression" for all citizens, allowing them to express their thoughts, voice opinions through speech, can give ideas through writing, or it can be any medium, crucial for democracy but subject to reasonable restrictions for national/state security, public order, morality, defamation, etc.

This freedom allows journalists to share news, to question government actions, to reveal corruption, and to express their views without unfair pressure. The law protects this right because a free press helps keep the system transparent, holds authorities responsible and allows people to make informed decisions. Also, this means that the Journalists are free to speak and report the news, but they must do so very carefully and honestly. They should share true and precise information, avoid spreading rumors, where they are not clear with the true facts or contents and also should think about how their words may affect people and society at large.

However, there are some important limits to Freedom of Speech in Journalism and that are defamation, hate speech and fake news. Defamation means making false statements about a person or any organization that harm their identity or reputation. Freedom of speech does not give anyone the right to damage someone's name by spreading lies. Journalists must check facts carefully before publishing news. If false information is published, it can harm innocent people and can lead to legal action against them for doing so.

Hate speech includes words or messages that spread hatredness or violence against a group based on religion, caste, race, gender, or nationality. Indian Constitution under Article 19 (1) (a) restricts hate speech to maintain peace and protect people from discrimination and violence.

Fake news refers to false or misleading information spread as if it was true. In today's digital age, fake news spreads very fast and can confuse people, create fear, or can cause social unrest. Freedom of speech does not allow spreading false information. Responsible journalism requires verifying news before sharing it with the public at large.

Thus, Freedom of speech is very important in a democracy and it allows journalists to share news and ideas. But this freedom comes with responsibility. Responsible Journalism helps people stay informed, protects society and makes sure freedom of speech is used in the right way and in right sense.
